# Make your own Mug Shot Activity




1900 'Mug shot' photos of Percy Davies, aged 13 or 14.



A 'mug shot' is a pair of photos of a person's head and shoulders taken when they are arrested for a crime.

One photo has the person looking straight at the camera, without smiling. The other is taken in 'profile' or side view.

Having two photos side-by-side makes it easy to identify the person, as the photographs show their features from different angles. Sometimes the person holds a board with their name on it and stand in front of a height chart to show how tall they are.



Make your own 'mug shot' and send it in. Remember – no smiling – and you need one picture taken from the front and one from the side. Think of a funny alias (false name) to put on the board if you decide to use one.
