Did you know?

MAPPA is not just for the management of sex offenders, it is also a mechanism to manage violent offenders (Category 2) and other high risk offenders (Category 3).

Category 3 is designed to provide a framework to manage those offenders who would not automatically fall into the other categories but whose behaviour is still of concern. Typically this could be a domestic abuse perpetrator who may have received a conviction for a Common Assault.

Category 3 Example

Male recently arrested for an assault on their partner, no further action taken.

Previous conviction for Criminal Damage, the circumstances of this offence was in the context of a domestic abusive relationship.

This is evidence of risk to current partner and history of such behaviour.

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Category 3 Offenders

A category 3 offender or "other dangerous offender" is an offender who is considered by the Responsible Authority to pose a risk of serious harm to the public which requires active multi-agency management. This could include offenders under the supervision of the National Probation Service or indeed those that are not subject to any statutory requirements.

To refer a Category 3 offender, ask yourself this....

- Has this individual committed an offence which indicates they are capable of causing serious harm to the public?
- Has this individual been convicted or received a formal caution or reprimand/warning for any offence?
- Does risk management require a multi-agency approach?
