John Newton (1725-1807). Was himself for a time a slave in Africa and later worked as a slaver. He wrote *Amazing Grace* at Christmas 1772, based on a religious conversion which he experienced during a storm at sea 1748. After his conversion he continued in the slave trade for some years, but later became a clergyman and preached against slavery.

The tune to which *Amazing Grace* was first sung is not known. It was set to *New Britain*, the tune now used, by William Walker, in the USA, in 1837. It is thought that *New Britain* was derived from the tune of *Fair Helen of Kirkconnell*, a Scottish ballad.

Amazing Grace has been adopted by human rights campaigners in many parts of the world.
