Long-term social care funded services used by adults aged 18+ with a learning disability

Key trends

According to snapshot data as at 31 March 2018 and 31 March 2020:


- ❖ The overall number of adults with a learning disability receiving long-term social care services funded by Gloucestershire County Council has increased, by 4.3%, from 1,278 to 1,333 people between the above two dates.
- ❖ The increase took place across community care, residential care and nursing care settings.
- ❖ The number receiving funded community care rose by 3.2%, from 973 to 1,004 people, and the number receiving funded residential care also rose, by 7.3%, from 303 to 325 people.
- ❖ Demand for nursing care for people with a learning disability remained small, having risen from 2 to 4 people between the two dates. The increase was for those who were aged 65 or over.

Snapshot data as at 31 March 2020 shows that:

- ❖ A total of 1,333 adults aged 18+ in Gloucestershire were receiving long-term care packages for a learning disability condition. Of these 75.3% were receiving community care services.
- ❖ Those aged 45-64 were the largest group in receipt of long-term care services (497 people, representing 37.3%), followed by the 25-44 year-olds (490, 36.8%) and the under-25s (157, 11.8%). The over-65s accounted for 14.2% of all users.





Adults with a learning disability receiving long-term care by age A snapshot





Number of adults aged 18+ receiving Community Care whose primary support reason is learning disability A snapshot




Number of adults aged 18+ receiving Community Care whose primary support reason is learning disability by age A snapshot

Number of adults aged 18+ receiving Residential Care whose primary support reason is learning disability




