Stories from the Big House

Big Houses were mansions owned by the rich and powerful. The wealthy family who lived in them were often aristocrats whose ancestors had lived in the same house for centuries!



Many Big Houses had over 100 rooms!



Some servants started work in the Big House as young as 8-10 years old!





The houses often had several generations of the same family living under the same roof at the same time. This included grandparents, parents, children and extended family.



The house was run by servants, who often lived in the house. Their bedrooms were in the attic which was hot in the summer and freezing in the winter!



The owners frequently held lavish parties. Sir Christopher Codrington's 21st birthday in March 1826 was 5 days long and cost £13,000!

People who lived in Big Houses

The owners of Big Houses were wealthy and sometimes had titles such as Lord, Lady, Earl, Duke and Duchess. Often, several generations of family lived in the large house, including grandparents, parents, children and extended family.



The larger the house, the more people were employed to work there.



Housekeepers, cooks and butlers were senior staff who ran the house.



Nannies, maids, valets and footmen also helped in the house.

Head gardeners, stable masters and gamekeepers ran the outdoor areas



Here is a picture of just some of the people who worked at the Dodington estate, South Gloucestershire, in 1890. These men worked in the gardens and park.

Many of the people who worked in the Big House, also lived there. There were special servants' rooms, normally on the top level of the house. These were small and often shared. Whereas the family lived in large and lavish rooms.

Who worked at Buckingham Palace in 1841?

This is a census return for Buckingham Palace in 1841, when Queen Victoria was living there. A census is when a government gathers information about its population, by sending out a form to be filled in by each household.

Buckingham Palace is one of the largest Royal Palaces in the world. It has been lived in by the Royal Family since 1761. The Palace has 775 rooms and its garden is the largest private garden in London!
