

STATEMENT OF REASONS

Proposed Humped Zebra Crossing – Innsworth Lane, Innsworth, Gloucestershire

Proposals

It is proposed to introduce a new raised Zebra Crossing on Innsworth Lane. The proposals are as follows:

Crossing to be installed:

Road humps to be installed:

Reasons

The proposals are in association with the ongoing residential development to the north of Innsworth Lane (planning ref - 15/00749/278/2). As part of the development works, it is proposed to introduce a humped zebra crossing on Innsworth Lane. The zebra crossing is proposed to provide improved pedestrian access to local schools from the new residential development to the north of Innsworth Lane. The zebra crossing is a requirement of the highway works for the new residential development.

The proposals are in alignment with Gloucestershire Climate Change Strategy and Gloucestershire's Local Transport Plan.

Highways Act 1980

The proposals for the Road Hump that the Zebra Crossing will be situated on are made under Section 90A of the Highways Act 1980 (as amended).

Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984

The proposal for the Zebra Crossing is made under Section 23 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.

Equality Act 2010

Thorough consideration was given to the equalities duty of the County Council under Section 149 of the Equality Act 2010.

Statutory Consultation

Consultation will be carried out with statutory consultees as part of this statutory notice process, including The Police, Emergency Services, Freight Transport Association, Road Haulage Association and the local County Councillor.
