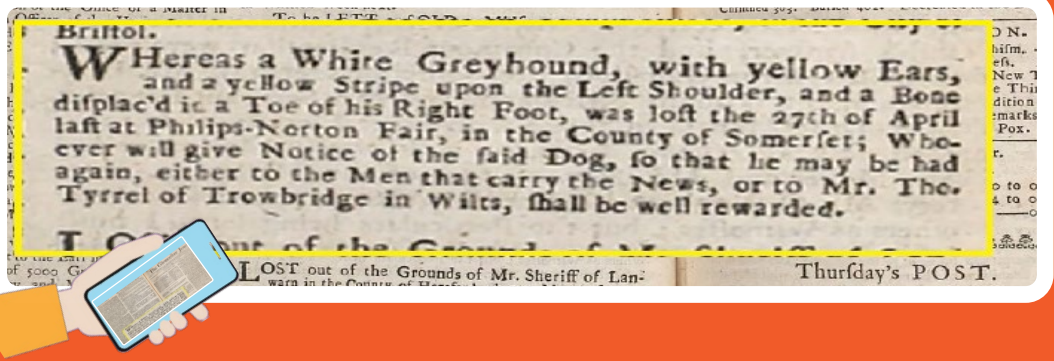

Extract of some Letters from Russia, Poland, and Germany.
THE Celebration of the Marriage of the Duke of Holstein
remains fixed for the 15th of May, and the Emperor has
made him a Prince of the Palace of the Grand Admiral
provisionally, for which he is to pay 2000 Roubles to the said
Admiral. The Divines still persist among the Grandees of Po-
land, so that there is an Appearance that the Diet of Grodno
can be held before Autumn. The Grand General of the
Crown Army has dispatched an Express to hailen the Troops
which are to reinforce the Poles on the Vistula, from Warsaw
to Danzig, and has ordered Redoubts to be raised along
that River, in order to be in a Condition to repulse any Troops
that may attempt to penetrate into Poland. On the other
hand, the Prussian Powers persist in their Resolution to
attack Poland towards the End of this Month, in case Satisfaction
is not given before that Time. And a Report runs, that an
Army of 100000 Crim Tartars are assembled, in order to
take an Advantage, by the Troops in Poland, to make an
Invasion into that Kingdom. The Russian Troops appointed
to assist Poland, are reinforced with two Regiments.

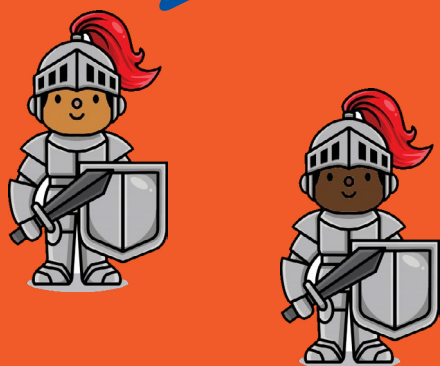

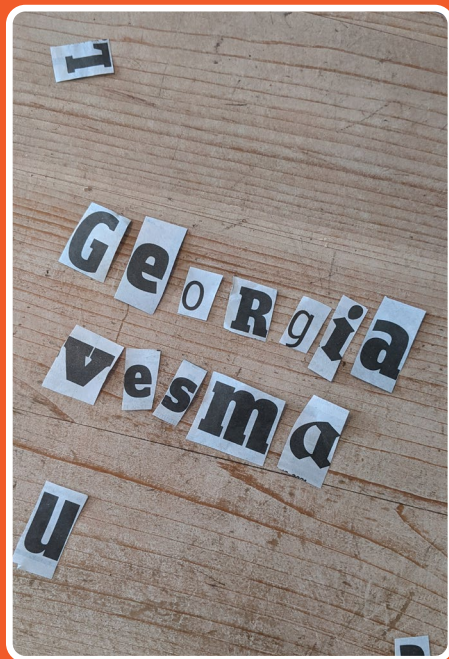

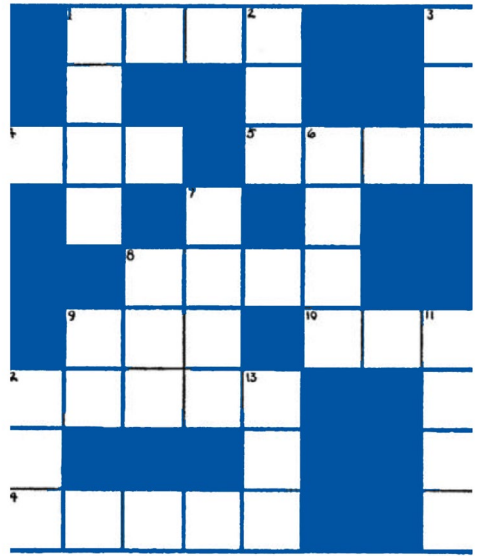
