Term of some Letters from a Ruffe Poet, and Germany.
THE Celebration of the Marriage of the Duke of Holstein
remained fixed for the 10th of May, and the Emperor has
made him a Prefect of the Palace of the Grand Admiral, A-
dmiral of the Baltic, and Admiral of the Sea and all the
Admirals. The Divorce still lingers among the Grandees of Po-
land, and there is an Appearance that the Diet of Warsaw
will be held in June next. The Grand General of the
Crown Army has dispatched an Express to his Friends
which are to reinforce the Poles on the Vistula, from Warsaw
to Danzig, and has ordered Redoubts to be raised along
the River Oder, and to be garrisoned, in order to prevent
any attempt to penetrate into Poland. On the other
hand, the Polish Powers persist in their Resolution to at-
tack the Russians, and to march into the Country, which
can be given before that Time. And a Report runs, that
an Army of 400000 Crim Tatars are assembled, in order to
take an Advantage, by the Russians in Poland, to make an
Invasion into the Country. The Poles, who are opposed
to the Russians, are reinforced with two Regiments.



Making birds and other animals fight with each other was a popular entertainment in the eighteenth century, and old newspapers often reported on these fights.



People used to bet money on which animal would win. This cruel 'sport' was banned in 1835.






