Long-term social care funded services used by adults aged 18+ with a mental health condition

Key trends

According to snapshot data as at 31 March 2018 and 31 March 2020:

- ❖ The number of adults aged 18 and over with a mental health condition receiving social care services funded by Gloucestershire County Council has increased by 43.8%, from 176 to 253 people, between the above two dates.
- ❖ The number increased across community, residential and nursing care settings. The number receiving community care and residential care rose by 45.2% (from 126 to 183 people) and 36.2% (from 47 to 64 people) respectively.
- ❖ The number receiving nursing care remained small, having doubled from 3 to 6 people, who were all aged between 45 and 74 .
- ❖ The largest increase in the number of users between these two dates was among the age groups 25-44 and 45-64, rising by 28 and 27 people respectively.


Snapshot data as at 31 March 2020 shows that:

- ❖ A total of 253 adults aged 18+ in Gloucestershire were receiving long-term care packages for a mental health condition. Of these nearly 72.3% were receiving community care services.
- ❖ Nearly half of the users were aged 45-64, representing the largest group (45.8%).
- ❖ This was followed by those aged 25-44 (27.7%). The 65-74 age group now accounted for 19.0% of the demand.
- ❖ Those aged under 25 and those aged 75+ accounted for a much smaller share (4.7% and 2.8% respectively).








Adults with Mental Health Need receiving Community Care Snapshot 31/03/2020



Number of adults aged 18+ receiving Residential Care whose primary support reason is mental health



Number of adults aged 18+ receiving Residential Care whose primary support reason is mental health by Age


