**Medieval castles were designed to be secure and protect the people who lived in them.**



This was built with a clockwise spiral – for ingenious reasons to do with defending the castle...Can you guess why?






This hole cut into the stone is on the outer wall of the castle, so whatever is dropped into it will fall outside... What do you think it was used for?



This 'oubliette' is named after the French word for forgetting. Beneath this grille is a large chamber.

#### Monks and Nuns




Monks and Nuns dedicate their lives to God. To begin with, Gloucester Cathedral was the home to many monks and nuns

Stone masons were the people who built the cathedral. They scratched their symbols into the stone they worked on. What symbol would you use?



The Great East Window was created hundreds of years ago. For many years it was the largest window in the world

Most churches and cathedrals have a tower, often with a spire on top. Bells are kept in the tower.

The cathedral has many ancient and important books, kept in their library. You reach the library by going up a narrow spiral staircase!


The Lady Chapel is a separate space for worship.

Recently changes have been made to allow every person to get around the cathedral. This includes new lifts and ramps. A post was removed from a doorway so wheelchairs can get through.

The mason who removed the post created a little salamander on the wall. If you know where to look, the cathedral is filled with interesting things!

- Did you know: Gloucester Cathedral has been used in many TV shows and films? This includes the Harry Potter films, Sherlock and Doctor Who.
- Did you know: The building narrowly escaped being destroyed in the 1500s? This was a time when hundreds of churches were destroyed and their treasures sold. Fortunately, King Henry VIII decided to turn it into a cathedral instead out of respect for King Edward II who was buried there.
- Did you know: The inside of the cathedral is also a graveyard? Very important people were buried underneath the floors. If you look down, you will notice there are many grave stones forming part of the floor throughout the building.





Did you know: There are beautiful memorials to important people? Here we have memorials to King Edward II who was murdered at nearby Berkeley Castle and to Elizabeth Williams who died aged 17, seen here with her baby.

# Fact File

## Gargoyles



These gargoyles can be seen on the outside of Gloucester Cathedral.

They replaced older ones which had become too damaged to repair.



Unlike most gargoyles, these ones were only made in the last few years.

Gargoyles can be found on many churches and cathedrals. Gargoyles are a carved sculpture with a spout which drains water away from the side of the building. This protected the church or cathedral from water damage



Gargoyles also protected their building by frightening away evil spirits. This is why they are so terrifying!
